JUNE CLUB NIGHT



Oh well, 'twas - more or less.


Sunday and the sun shone more, Most people getting brown. And there - Phil Whitter sitting down! Has this been known before?

GOODBYE, AUREVOIR, WE'LL SEE YU COBBER




