TIP OF THE MONTH - taken from the above

Newsletter in 1978:

A surprising number of Sevenists, hearing a low-toned knocking noise or rumble from the engine immediately suspect big-end or main-bearing troubles and straightway proceed to remove the engine and commence a complete strip-down. Half a day later the engine is strewn all over the floor and the puzzled owner is wondering just what IS wrong with the bearings. The answer could simply be - NOTHING! Several defects can cause the rumbling including worn timing gears, end-float in the dynamo and end-float in the crankshaft. So, before breaking the seals on the shiny new socket set you had for Christmas, apply a couple of simple tests:

Slack Timing Wheels (on a coil engine) can be tested by slackening off the fan belt then, with the engine idling, hold the fan with one hand and with the other press the two sides of the fan belt together to put a load on the camshaft pulley. If the noise then decreases substantially the timing wheels are worn. Replacement does not involve removing the engine.

End Float on the Dynamo: Remove the cover-plate from the gears end and remove the split pin. With the engine idling press a large screwdriver (or similar) against the end of the armature shaft in the central hole. If the noise decreases the problem is end-float.

CHRISTMAS ANGELS

Heavy white cartridge paper, gold coloured card, poly/cotton balls 1" dia., gold thread/yarn, gold ribbon & gold bits and pieces, gold marker pen.

Before assembly you may wish to add the decorations to the wings, the dress, the face and the sleeves.

Transfer the patterns B, C, D & E onto the white card and cut out. The bottom of B can be done with pinking shears to get a scalloped effect. Glue the edges of B together (with a slight overlap) to make a cone. Repeat for C and glue C to the top of B and glue both to a ball. The angels can be used as decorations or as place card holders. For decorations, stick only the tips of the fingers of D together and bow-out the arms. Glue D to the back of B. For
