Stan's Story

S TAN WARBURTON is possibly our eldest member and certainly our oldest active member being a member of the DA7C for seven years and the Bristol A7C for many years before that.

Stan was born in Dorchester in March 1919 but very soon moved to Cattislock for all his school years returning to Dorchester when he was 15 first as an errand boy then later working in stables. At 17 he moved to a new stables near Staines owned by Lady Astorthe country's first lady MP and later to Lord Thornycroft's stables at Telmington Gardens.

Before the start of the second world war Stan joined the Territorial Army and was soon transferred to the 4th. Dorset Regiment to guard the south coast to keep Hitler out. On June 6th. 1944 Stan was all ready to sail from Tilbury Docks for Normandy except his ship did not turn up until June 20th. and he arrived in fortnight France a However, the 4th. Dorsets soon caught up and, armed with bren carriers helped to Hitler back into push Germany. Stan survived and found his way home via Italy in February 1946 to marry his long-term sweetheart Vera. They had two children, Roy Theresa and and two grandchildren, Brian and Nicola. Most of Stan's adult working life has been in the building trade with Eldridge Pope carrying out maintenance work in their many pubs, semiretiring in 1986 to go on for another 6 years part-time.

Stan started motoring in 1937 with motorcycles but soon turned to Austins in 1938 with a succession including a 1926 Top Hat (£20), a '27 Chummy (£25) and a Box which took

his family and brother Doug on a 2,500 mile touring and camping holiday around England. He has owned his current Ruby (complete with flag and permanent handsignal) for 40 years and is often seen on runs with his partner Sheila and at Steam rallies.

This year, Stan has celebrated his 80th. year and was given a huge surprise by his grand-daughter. Thinking he was just going round for tea, he was taken to the local village hall to be greeted by all his friends and family.

SUPER-CHARGED - 2nd. SUPER MOUSE - 1st.

GOODWOOD SPRINT - 27/5/99

blisteringly hot Saturday in May saw another two firsts for Super Mouse and its intrepid driver Dorset Dave - PITS AND SPRINTING. The pits were rows and rows of bike sheds and sprinting was arranged by the PreWar A7C as part 2 of the Bert Hadley Trophy. (Part 1 was the Gurston Hill climb last month).

5 trusty Sevens did battle amongst a sea of Matlocks, Caterhams, Loti, TVIs and a Volvo - Peter Pearson in his beautiful supercharged single seater, Graham Beckett in an Ulsteroid, Stephen Warwick in a bog-standard A7 TT Replica with windscreen, lights etc., Mike Gilbert in a very serious looking racing Seven and The Mouse.

Mike went out in practice with a totally disintegrated piston and the four remaining set to to do battle. Sprinting is a strange affair. The cars line up on the grid but go off one at a time at about 10 second intervals and so there is little sense of how one is doing until the results are posted.

In the first round, the Mouse started to smoke badly from under the bonnet and DD had to navigate through a self-imposed fog coming in 15 seconds slower than The Supercharger.
